# Refugees Guests of The Times

Two refugees who faced death in Hungary a month ago are today facing life beyond their fondest dreams as they tour Los Angeles as guests of The Times.

Ferenc Erdelyi and his wife Eszter were the last known Hungarian refugees to make their way across the border into Austria as Soviet Union armed might mercilessly crushed the revolution.

From Camp Kilmer, N.J., they were selected by The Times to be the newspaper's guests at the inauguration of President Eisenhower, to view the historic spots in Washington and to fly to the West Coast for a more extensive look at this country.

They have been given this opportunity not merely as individuals but more as symbols of the brave Hungarian people who chose to risk death in revolution rather than continue to submit meekly to Communist excesses.

The Erdelyis, described during their Washington visit as "delayed Pilgrims," are speedily justifying their right to be known as such. They say their goal is to get jobs, a home and settle down as good Americans.

They will get along on their own and The Times is pleased to assist them in seeing America and giving America the opportunity to see these representatives of freedom-loving Hungarians.
